At One Million Degrees (OMD), we believe in the incredible potential of community college students, and we're committed to helping them succeed in school, work, and life.

As OMD Board Leaders, we've seen firsthand how our holistic student support empowers scholars to achieve their college and career goals. This work changes scholars' lives. But OMD's impact doesn't end there—it ripples through families, communities, and the systems in which we live and work.

As we reflect on the past year and look toward an exciting future, this impact is clearer than ever. Now two years into our expanded partnership with City Colleges of Chicago, we've grown from serving 650 students in 2022 to over 2,000 this year, and we're already seeing promising results. Halfway through the first phase of this expansion, our scholars are demonstrating strong persistence from fall to spring and fall to fall semesters—a powerful predictor of college completion. This is just one signal that our work continues to make a measurable, meaningful impact on scholars' lives.

In this report, you'll learn more about that early impact data, and read stories that bring it to life.

You'll meet Deyssi, who, despite many obstacles, persisted in school with the support and guidance of her OMD Program Coordinator, Shatera. You'll also hear from Ameer, who has grown into a confident leader, finding his voice and purpose through opportunities like our Al cohort in partnership with Microsoft.

You'll read about OMD's ever-widening impact within our professional community from Mark Anthony, a former OMD staff member who is now Program Officer for the Angell Foundation, one of our generous funders. You'll see the ripple effect our impact has via scholar alumni who have returned as coaches, mentoring the next generation of OMD scholars.

IMPACT THAT SCALES

One Million Degrees is serving more scholars than ever.

2024 brought us halfway through our pilot expansion project with City Colleges of Chicago (CCC), where we are scaling to provide the OMD support model to thousands of students across all seven of the CCC campuses.

Under the expanded model, live at Olive-Harvey, Malcolm X and, as of Fall 2024, Harold Washington Colleges, all eligible students have access to OMD support—without having to apply.

Deyssi's Story

"I'm so proud that I didn't give up. Literally a year ago, I nearly dropped out. And here I am now, in my second year, a couple months away from graduating."

We hear it repeatedly in scholar surveys and research findings: OMD Program Coordinators are one of the most impactful parts of the OMD experience. This is particularly true for Deyssi and Shatera.

For Deyssi, an OMD Scholar and participant in the Teach Chicago Tomorrow program at Truman College, the college experience has been marked by obstacles including moments of academic pressure and self-doubt. But instead of quitting, Deyssi persisted—driven by a dream of becoming a teacher and fueled by the support of OMD and her Program Coordinator Shatera.

Shatera supported Deyssi through some of the toughest moments of her time in college. "One year ago today," she says, "I called Shatera up and said, 'I'm dropping out. I don't want to do this anymore.' She didn't force me to stay—but she did ask me to rethink it. She reminded me that we all fall, that we're not perfect, and that we're all going to go through times where we just need to continue. And that's what I did."

Reflecting on what it's been like working with Deyssi, Shatera says, "She shows up authentically herself and it shines through in our work together. Deyssi has the courage to want things for herself, to know when to ask for help, and she has chosen her own success. I am just immensely proud of her."

Now, just a few months before she graduates from Truman College and pursues her bachelor's degree at Northeastern Illinois University, Deyssi's persistence is stronger than ever. "I'm so proud that I didn't give up. Literally a year ago, I nearly dropped out. And here I am now, in my second year, a couple months away from graduating."

Deyssi's story is a testament to the power of persistence—and to the critical role OMD Program Coordinators play in helping scholars overcome the hardships that so often stand in the way of their success.

Ameer's Story

When Ameer Longe arrived in the United States from Nigeria, he brought with him a determination to build a future in computer science. Since then, as a student and OMD Scholar at Olive-Harvey College, has excelled academically, emerged as a leader, and advocated for himself and his peers.

For Ameer, OMD has been more than a support system; it has been a launchpad.


Ameer hit the ground running when he began school. A dedicated student, he earned a place in Phi Theta Kappa, the international honor society recognizing academic excellence. He joined the Olive-Harvey Student Government Association as a Senator, and was later elected President, a role he currently serves.

Throughout this journey, Ameer says that OMD and the encouragement of Harold, his Program Coordinator, provided mentorship, guidance, and support to help ease his path. "OMD allows me to focus on my studies, my leadership roles, and my growth," he says. "With their support, I have been able to make the most of every opportunity."

One of the opportunities Ameer seized was an initiative OMD launched with Microsoft as part of their generous support of our work: Generative AI for Beginners program, powered by Microsoft tools. This application-based program is designed to teach community college students about how to use generative AI technologies in their academic and professional development. Launched in 2024 with two cohorts, including Ameer's, this pilot reached 39 students, attaining a 90% certification rate in the first cohort and 84% in the second cohort.

"This program was a game-changer," he says. "I learned not only how AI can be used to advance academic and professional goals but also the importance of using it ethically and responsibly. It gave me a strong foundation in a field I am passionate about and has opened my eyes to possibilities in technology and beyond."

From Olive-Harvey, Ameer plans to continue his education, specializing in cybersecurity and computer science, at the University of Illinois at Chicago.

Mark Anthony's Story

Mark Anthony Florido's journey with One Million Degrees (OMD) tells the story of OMD's impact, not only on the lives of scholars, but also on the careers of those who dedicate themselves to our mission and the education field at large.

Beginning as a Program Associate in 2009, Mark saw OMD, then known as the Illinois Education Foundation, in its formative, "scrappy" days. Tasks were very hands-on, ranging from tracking down suits for scholar events to locating shelter for an unhoused student.

"We were 360 degrees of support," he says, "and at that time, no one was doing that for community college students. You could feel the impact through each student's reaction. It was clear that what we were doing mattered."

In those early years, OMD was already proving itself as a powerful force for community college students in Chicago, expanding from serving just 15 new scholars to nearly 75 within three years. The demand was tangible, and the support OMD offered was making an undeniable difference.

Mark Anthony's experience at OMD changed his career trajectory, leading him to pursue a graduate degree in higher education and student affairs. Now, as Program Officer – Social Impact at the Angell Foundation, he continues to champion educational access—only this time, from the vantage point of one of OMD's funders.

The Angell Foundation is dedicated to advancing a world of thriving and equitable communities, and its support for OMD reflects a shared commitment to removing barriers and creating opportunities for community college students. On his work with the Foundation, Mark Anthony says, "I now work at the ecosystems level, rather than working with individual students, focusing on the full educational landscape and how we can better support students."

About OMD, Mark Anthony continues, "OMD is an important part of this ecosystem. On one hand, OMD is a cheerleader for community college students in Chicago. On the other hand, OMD is invested in systems level thinking and change. OMD asks, how can we nationally partner and change systems? How can we reimagine the community college student experience from top to bottom?"

Through Mark Anthony's journey, OMD's impact is clear. What began as a small, community-driven organization has transformed into a growing nonprofit, providing wraparound support for thousands of scholars, building roadmaps for likeminded organizations, and shaping careers along the way.

IMPACT THAT INSPIRES MENTORS

OMD coaches act as cheerleaders, mentors, and thought partners, making a lasting difference in scholars' academic, professional, and personal lives.

As we've expanded into City Colleges of Chicago, we've also needed to scale the number of coaches available to work with the growing number of scholars we serve. In 2024, we were able to onboard over 300 coaches through a combination of recruitment efforts, one of which involved reaching out the group who knows a coach's impact the best: OMD Alumni.

By the end of the program, I was taking big risks, applying for a bachelor's degree, and pursuing jobs I felt underqualified for. Today, I'm an engineer with a degree in computer science and I have become an OMD coach, eager to give back the support I received."



"As a first-generation college student, I didn't know the value of a mentor or career coach. But after benefiting from OMD's support, I decided to become a coach myself. I relate to the students I coach because, like them, I faced struggles—working dead-end jobs, navigating community college, and figuring out my path. My OMD coach helped me manage challenges at work, school, and in life, and their guidance was crucial to my success. Now, I try to do the same for others."
